 AAUW FL is supporting Floridians Protecting Freedom in its campaign to place on the ballot a constitutional "Amendment to Limit Government Interference in Abortion." FPF has notified AAUW that not enough districts have met the total number needed to meet the mandated "geographical diversity" requirement. Manatee is one of those districts.  Student Debt webinar – December 7 at 2pm Eastern AAUW is hosting an online discussion to provide practical information to people with student loans to help them make the best decisions for themselves to address their student debt. This free event with The Institute of Student Loan Advisors will provide specific and actionable information about income-driven repayment plans like SAVE, and other student loan resources available from the Department of Education, as well as provide an overview of upcoming regulatory and congressional actions impacting student debt. • Equal Rights Amendment March – December 13 at 11:30a (in person and virtual)

December 13 commemorates the 100th anniversary of the first introduction of the Equal Rights Amendment in Congress. As part of the ERA Coalition,AAUW will take to the streets in Washington, DC for a march from the White House to Capitol Hill. Information on a virtual action will soon be available.

- Co-Public Policy Director for AAUW FL, Dr. Mary Gatta, also the Director of Research and Public Policy for the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE), has shared a resource just released at NACE. This new research was competed in partnership with Break Through Tech at Cornell University. The new report <u>Women and Tech Careers</u>—investigates the current landscape for women pursuing careers in technical fields and what can be done to improve outcomes for women. One of the study's key findings is the impact college career services can have in leveling the playing field for women in general and particularly for women pursuing tech careers:

Specifically --Undergraduate men get more job offers than undergraduate women regardless of whether they use career services, but the use of career services helps narrow the gap between the two groups. **However**, when undergraduate women earning STEM-related degrees use career services, they get MORE job offers than their male counterparts; in contrast, when neither group uses career services, men earning STEM degrees get more job offers.

BEWARE OF SCAMS AND FRAUDS!

We are all vulnerable, so it pays - sometimes literally - to be alert.

Before opening any attachment or image, before even replying, check the actual address of the sender. If the address doesn't seem right, don't reply! When in doubt, verify. Call a trusted friend first. Don't ever send personal information, money, or gift cards, to anyone you suspect. Scammers have become extremely convincing, and they will indicate urgency that you act right away. Take the time to think first!



Spotlight on ... Vicki Waters

Vicki Waters was born in Charleston, SC, but moved with her family to Northern Virginia when she was 10 years old. She went through school in Arlington but spent summers in SC with her matriarch grandmother and 21

Vicki earned a BA in Spanish and Latin American Studies at Winthrop University, in Rock Hill, SC. Additionally, she studied at Georgetown University focusing on professional training in copy editing.

first cousins and aunts and uncles nearby.

In 1966 Vicki left SC for Bolivia where she served for three years in the Peace Corps. After serving as a community development Peace Corps volunteer, Vicki began working as the assistant academic advisor at the Defense Language Institute in Maryland and moved to Monterey, CA when the headquarters consolidated with the West Coast school.

That move paved the way for Vicki to meet and fall in love with "a dashing Army Lieutenant Colonel" named Sasha Taurke. Vicki said she reluctantly agreed to marry him so that she could follow him to a fascinating assignment in Frankfort, Germany, where Lt. Taurke would serve as the American liaison to the Soviet Military Mission in Frankfurt.

After three years there, they moved to Falls Church, VA where Sasha retired from the US Army, and Vicki decided to work for an Oklahoma Congressman because of concerns about the policies and direction of the Reagan administration. After about four years as a legislative assistant, she said she "returned to the sanity and focus of the military" to become a program analyst in the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (ICAF), a part of the National Defense University. She and Sasha retired to Bradenton in 1992.

Retirement is still a busy time for Vicki who has been an active member of AAUW Manatee since 1995 and joined the Bradenton Branch several years ago. She has held many positions with the Manatee Branch, including the presidency. She served as FL AAUW Public Policy Director from 2009-11. She has been active with the local Democratic Party since the 1990s, helping candidates and advising them on strategy and tactics.

Vicki is an avid follower of international news, also enjoys reading, travelling in the family recreational vehicle across the US, and visiting family on both coasts, plus a niece in Hawaii. She is blessed with four step-grandchildren who affectionately call her "Granny."

Since Vicki was born on October 17th, she is a Libra, an astrological sign represented by the scales, reflecting balance and harmony.
